The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about the area in which they live. Learning may focus on your local area, famous people, key landmarks and links to your city.

• Let's Wonder:

Think about your street. What type of houses are on your street? What type of house do you live in? What other buildings are close by? Find out about your local area, what different buildings does it have? How old are some of those buildings? How have they changed over time? Use a map to locate different places. Let's Create:

Choose a building you most admire in your local area. Make a model of that building using materials of their choice. (Playdough, junk modelling, lego etc.....) How well did you do? What would you do differently next time? What have you learnt?



Be Active:

Get out into the garden or balcony, pull up some weeds or mow the lawn? Does your garden need a tidy up? Maybe you could plant some seeds. • Time to Talk:

Were your family members all born in this local area? If not, how is their place of birth different to your own local area? If they were born in your local area, how different is the local area since they were born? Talk about their memories of how it has changed.



• Understanding Others and Appreciating Differences:

Research different places of worship that can be found in your local area. Can you find their nearest Church? Mosque? Synagogue? Temple? Gurdwara? What can you find out about them? • Reflect:

Think about what would improve your local area? What is your local area missing? What spoils your local area? What could be done? You could create a poster.




Non-Chronological Report Text Features

Here are the features of a report text.

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	Topic title covers the whole subject.
	Brief introduction paragraph gives who/ what/ where.
	Information organised into paragraphs with subheadings
	Include pictures.
	Some information may be in fact boxes or bullet-point lists.
	Present tense verbs (e.g. Cobham is) and formal tone.

Setting

- · When you write about a setting, you need to make sure you use lots of description so a reader can picture themselves there.
- Effective descriptions appeal to the senses.
